- Voluntary/Mandatory/Purchase options all may have a part
- Concern that WRAPS is only focused on quality.
- Others felt that where sedimentation is the priority, quantity was the driver
- The lake may not be listed as impaired for sedimentation, however local plans address sediment (Delaware)
- The goal of NRCS standards and timeframe can be an encumbrance
- There needs to be a comprehensive conservation plan this should be criteria for funding
- Getting information to the producer is a challenge
- To implement change, recognize that 60% of the Water Plan fund goes to the Department of Conservation.
- State autonomy from feds needs to be a focus
- A clearinghouse for the producer would be helpful
- There should be a committee to prioritize funding
- The WRAPS approach the WRAPS system is the approach. Funding is the key. How make it better
- Voluntary may not always be sufficient
- Are practices permanent
- KWA should have oversight on action plans
- KDHE track on the ground practices and could do a report at KWA
- What information is there on plans for detention dams in the watershed?

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Committee Expectations:

Earl Lewis went through the expectations of members, which includes the relationship as advisors to the Kansas Water Authority and Kansas Water Office, serving as eyes and ears within the region and as solicitors of public input. The committee will be working on implementation of the goals through the water planning process. Key dates are: Dec 17, 2015 –RAC chairs will share the first priority goal for which an action plan will be developed at the KWA meeting Spring, 2016 – Action plan completed. Fall, 2016 – plan of action for all goals that need one

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Review of Regional Goals (For your convenience, I have placed the goals at the end of these notes.) Sarah provided an overview of the goals. After significant discussion, it was determined that the committee would begin focus on the goal: **Priority Goal**: Reduce the cumulative sediment rate of federal reservoirs and other water supply lakes by 10 percent in the Kansas region every 10 years through implementation of watershed best management practices.

The committee discussed the development of an **action plan** and the interrelationships between the goals. A rough draft of the start of an action plan was: Develop a comprehensive, watershed-wide, anti-sedimentation program that leverages existing infrastructure including WRAPS and the Kansas Water Office's Comprehensive Streambank Program."

Each committee member was challenged to develop their own action plan for this goal that will be summarized for discussion by the full committee at the next meeting, to be held before the Dec. 17 KWA meeting. Send these ideas to margaret.fast@kwo.ks.gov

The committee members asked for additional **background information** to be able to continue work on the development of the action plan. These will be presented in webinars. (We use a program called GLANCE). The most pressing to address the sedimentation goal is characterized as follows:

What is the current science on preventing sedimentation? What methods are the most effective, and in what way should they applied? What is being done in Kansas today to address sedimentation? What programs are in existence? Are they state, federal, local? How do they work? How effective have they been? What are their impediments to success? Can existing programs do it all? What (if any) additional programs or organization do we need to implement in order to achieve the proposed 10% reduction in sedimentation? This will include an overview of the Watershed Restoration and Protection Program (WRAPS) to address sedimentation.

Note: The GLANCE session has been scheduled for October 29, 2015 from 8-9am.

Another session will be planned to address the storage in the federal reservoirs. The committee would like a better understanding of the finances and hear (from more than one source) more about the costs and benefits associated with buying more storage, navigation releases and recreational uses of the conservation pool. This education session will be scheduled as the committee is ready to develop an Action Plan for #1.

Vision Implementation:

David Barfield and Katie Tietsort, KDA, were in attendance to review items that in most cases were raised during the discussion of the "Long-term Vision of r the Future of Water Supply in Kansas." David reviewed Water Conservation Areas. Katie reviewed Rules and Regulations that the agency is developing. Input is being sought until Nov. 15 on the development of the regs. Once the rules and regs are drafted, there will again be opportunity for public input. Those items being addressed are:

Limiting Movement of Point of Diversion Civil Penalties for Exceeding Authorized Quantity Civil Fines for Lack of Water Use Report Authority to Seal Meters

STREAMBANK PROJECT UPDATE

- Construction completed on 6 out of 10 sites funded by KDHE/EPA
 - 1 site for fall/winter 2015, 3 by spring 2016
- \$800,000 legislature approved for streambanks--\$400,000 each of two years.
- Thanks to team efforts of Republican BAC, KWA, Legislators, KDHE, KWO, DOC & Glacial Hills RC&D
- 1st \$400,000—4 designs & 3 sites to be constructed spring/summer
 2016
- o 2nd \$400,000—4th design to be constructed in fall 2016 with additional designs & construction sites in 2017
